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A GOOD SOLDIER

Consider (continuously, commanded, my choice) what I say (MEDITATE ON THESE THINGS), for the Lord will give you understanding in everything.

Soldier - learn the absolute necessity of pleasing commanding officer and setting aside any distractions from that duty (v. 4).

Athlete - learn the necessity of competing according to the rules to win the event (v. 5). God has set the rules for this contest and it involves suffering hardship.

Farmer - learn the need for arduous labor (hardworking) but also for appropriating for ourselves the results we are trying to bring about (the crops, v. 6).

Verse 7 urges us to reflect on these things and to rely on the Lord to ?give insight into all this,? that is, how these images instruct us about Christian life and ministry.

(NIV = "REFLECT" which is defined as suggests unhurried consideration of something recalled to the mind. REFLECTION = a thought, idea, or opinion formed or a remark made as a result of meditation)

Doubtless realized there is a "DAY" of reward for good soldiers who faithfully serve their "Captain" or "Commander" (Josh5:14)

APPLICATION: The question for each of us as His disciple called to suffer hardship (evil) with Him is -- How far down the rugged road of discipleship are we willing to follow Christ? Until we are willing to die for Him, we cannot really say that we are willing to live for Him.

The faithful Christian will not shrink back from speaking up about Christ and his work. Loyalty to the Lord is measured in perseverance in the face of opposition. We also learn that all that is needed to be this kind of Christian is provided -- power, love, discipline & "the grace that is in Christ Jesus"

Have you ever been forsaken by anyone in your hour of greatest need? "Super saints" have emotions too and are not immune to their circumstances

Two unwilling to die

One willing to die (good soldier)

Contrast - selfish motives of these men versus the selfless motives of Onesiphorus.

3 Christ-like characteristics exemplified by Onesiphorus:

1) unconcerned for self ("he often refreshed me"),

2) undaunted by sacrifice ("when he was in Rome he eagerly searched for me")

3) unceasing in expression ("you know very well what services he rendered at Ephesus")

Truly Onesiphorus is an outstanding example of all that Paul has been exhorting Timothy to do. Onesiphorus has been eternally etched upon the pages of Scripture for his selfless, sacrificial service. Truly it is only by losing our life for the sake of Christ that we guarantee its worth to be saved beyond the grave.

ADDITIONAL NOTES A GOOD SOLDIER IS READY AND WILLING TO DIE FOR HIS COMMANDER:

This verse (**2Ti2:4**) was **Jim Elliot's "Life Verse"** -- Before Elizabeth Elliot became Jim's wife, she was Elizabeth Howard a student at Wheaton College. She had scrutinized the boys on campus and decided that there was really only one who interested her and his name was Jim Elliot. He displayed a maturity and godliness that was very attractive. When the school yearbooks were handed out, Elizabeth asked Jim to sign hers, hoping that if there was any interest in her, he might indicate so in signing her yearbook. When he returned it, she rushed to her room, found his signature and read beneath it "**2Timothy 2:4.**" He later wrote "*he is no fool who gives up what he cannot keep to gain what he cannot lose.*" He was willing to suffer hardship as a good soldier even it meant dying for his Commander which is exactly what he did. His actions backed up the words he lived by in 2 Timothy 2:4.

He was a good soldier like Paul who said ***"I do not consider my life of any account as dear to myself, in order that I may finish my course, and the ministry which I received from the Lord Jesus, to testify solemnly of the gospel of the grace of God."*** (Acts 20:24)

Our problem is not physical death, but the daily call to die to my own desires and interests and consider others more important than myself! It would be easier to die physically I think.

A strong desire to please God is the highest incentive for doing His will and shows a true understanding of godly fear. We may have other worthy motives, such as the inner satisfaction of doing what's right or the anticipation of heavenly rewards. ...the reason why they bear the fatigue of battles so easily; for neither can any disorder remove them from their usual regularity, nor can fear affright them out of it, nor can labor tire them; which firmness of conduct makes them always to overcome those that have not the same firmness; nor would he be mistaken that should call those their exercises unbloody battles, and their battles bloody exercises.

...Nor can their enemies easily surprise them with the suddenness of their incursions; for as soon as they have marched into an enemy's land

...they do not begin to fight till they have walled their camp about;

nor is the fence they raise rashly made, or uneven;

nor do they all abide in it,

nor do those that are in it take their places at random;

but if it happens that the ground is uneven, it is first leveled:

their camp is also foursquare by measure,

and carpenters are ready, in great numbers, with their tools, to erect their buildings for them

Roman soldiers were bound to service through a long term, took a solemn oath, were never to desert their standard (the golden eagle), were to submit their will to the commands of the leaders, were to sacrifice their life for the safety of the Emperor, received excellent pay, were constantly involved in military exercises regardless of age or weather conditions, exercised with weights double those used in actual warfare, cultivated the science of tactics, were able to advance 20 miles in 6 hours even with their baggage until they met the enemy. Soldiers were not allowed to marry during their term of service and were to be strictly devoted to their service for over twenty years but only about half survived to retire.

We look upon every young convert as a recruit; not merely as one who has been himself saved, but as having within his new-born mature the possibilities of a good soldier of Jesus Christ.

THE GOOD AND THE BEST...

Paul's appeal shows the importance of developing an ability to distinguish between doing good things and doing the best things. Servants of Christ are not merely to be well-rounded dabblers in all types of trivial pursuits. They are tough-minded devotees of Christ who constantly choose the right priorities from a list of potential selections. Paul prohibited the loss of single-mindedness and the longing for an easy life.

WHEN IS THE CHRISTIAN SOLDIER ON DUTY?

John MacArthur points out that A soldier in active service does not have a 9 to 5 job, or even a long 60– or 70–hour work week. He is a soldier 24 hours a day, every day of the year. His body, his health, his skills, his time—all that he is—belong to the military in which he serves. Even when on leave, he is subject to recall at any time, without notice and for any reason. And whenever ordered into dangerous duty, he is expected to put his very life on the line without question or hesitation. MacArthur, J. (1996, c1995). 2 Timothy. Chicago, Ill.: Moody Press.

WHO DO CHRISTIANS SOMETIMES SEEK TO PLEASE?

Many Christians succumb to that temptation and become more concerned about pleasing their fellow workers, their neighbors, and their friends than about pleasing the Lord. And for the same reason, many pastors fall into the trap of wanting to please their congregations or their communities more than to please the Lord. That desire inevitably leads to moral and spiritual decline, because pleasing the world, including worldly Christians, demands compromise of God's truth, God's standards, and personal holiness MacArthur, J. (1996, c1995). 2 Timothy. Chicago, Ill.: Moody Press.

1 Thes 2:4 "but just as we have been approved by God to be entrusted with the gospel, so we speak, not as pleasing men but God, who examines our hearts."

Did Timothy obey? Paul answers this himself writing later that "you followed (closely, side by side) my teaching, conduct, purpose, faith, patience, love, perseverance, persecutions, and sufferings..." (2Tim3:10, 11) The writer of Hebrews has an interesting entry near the close of the letter recording...

"Take notice that our brother Timothy has been released, with whom, if he comes soon, I shall see you." (Heb13:23)!

Plummer notes he would have understood that Paul's charge was no small matter but that it involved.."self-sacrifice, endurance, discipline, vigilance, obedience, ready co-operation with others, sympathy, enthusiasm, loyalty."

All believers must recognize that the Christian life is not a playground; but a battlefield where battles are being won and lost in real spiritual battles. Ultimately Christ Jesus has been victorious over the powers of darkness at Calvary, but in the meantime He has left us here and called us to be "good soldiers".

"Thanks be to God, Who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ." (1Cor15:57)

Elizabeth had scrutinized the boys on campus and decided that there was really only one who interested her and his name was Jim Elliot. He displayed a maturity and godliness she found most attractive. When the school yearbooks were handed out, Elizabeth asked Jim to sign hers, hoping that if there was any interest in her, he might indicate so in signing her yearbook. When he returned it, she rushed to her room, found his signature and read beneath it "**2Timothy 2:4.**" He later wrote

*"He is no fool who gives up what he cannot keep
to gain what he cannot lose."*

He was willing to suffer hardship as a good soldier even it meant dying for his Commander which is exactly what he did. His actions backed up the words he lived by in 2 Timothy 2:4. He was a good soldier like Paul who said

Entangles ([1707](#)) (**empleko** from **en** = in + **pléko** = tie, braid, twist) means to wrap or twist together and so to entwine. It was used of a sheep whose wool was caught in thorns - this illustrates the difference between "involvement" and "entanglement" - one is entangled when he is not free to get loose! When the affairs of this life hem us in so tightly that we can't get loose to fulfill our Captain's commands then we have become **entangled** in the "thorns" of non-eternal pursuits. The world's pleasures can easily entwine us especially in hedonistic America!

DAILY BREAD "WHAT COMES NATURALLY?"...

The story is told about an elderly man who retired after many years in the British Army. One day a man who knew about his long and distinguished military career decided to play a prank on him. As the old soldier walked down the street with his arms full of packages, the jokester sneaked up behind him and shouted, "Attention!" Without hesitation, the military man dropped his arms to his side, and every package went tumbling to the sidewalk. Without a conscious thought, the veteran was doing what comes naturally for a soldier. Similarly, as believers in Christ, we should respond in a manner that corresponds with our new life. Our behavior is to be more and more in line with the example of Jesus' life. We still must deal with sinful desires, so we need to discipline ourselves to be the kind of person God wants us to be. Like a soldier or athlete in training (2 Timothy 2:3-5), we need to practice repeatedly until doing what's right comes naturally.

Through faith in Christ we are children of the heavenly Father. By the power of the indwelling Spirit, therefore, let us develop the habit of submitting to God's Word.

Eph 6:16 FIERY MISSILES OF THE EVIL ONE...

The fiery darts, the flaming missiles of the evil one, give us a picture of how the devil works in our life. I think the battle is in the mind. As we think, so are we. Our enemy is constantly trying to deceive us as John says in the Revelation...

"And the great dragon was thrown down, the serpent of old who is called the devil and Satan, who deceives (present tense =

continually) (Click for word study on deceive) the whole world; he was thrown down to the earth, and his angels were thrown down with him." (cf [Revelation 12:9](#)).

He is constantly trying to lead us astray with wrong thinking. What would the darts be wrapped up in? To me it would have to be thoughts that he is constantly throwing at us. These thoughts are like "Scud missiles" coming into our mind. We can't turn on the television without these "fiery missiles" bombarding our living room. We can't walk into the world without these thoughts bombarding our mind. So as those things are coming in, we must make a conscious choice to adhere to the truth. Then you can recognize the deception and error. Secondly you have to obey the truth that you are adhering to. Your willingness to obey wards off those darts that are coming in.

Friend, listen, you are up against an enemy that wants to get your mind.

If he can lock it up and hold it hostage with immoral thoughts, he will do it.

If he can lock it up with anger, he will do it.

If he can lock it up with resentment, he will do it.

DISCUSSION - LESSON 6 - 2 TIMOTHY

GOAL - class will understand what it means to be a good soldier of Jesus Christ

UNDERSTAND - a good soldier must be strong in the grace, suffer, and remain in the suffering with one purpose to glorify God, does not get entangled, but is wholehearted

REMEMBER - puts on whole armor, stands in armor

APPLY –

Are you a good soldier willing to suffer hardship?

Are you entangled?

What is it that you can get free from?

Are you willing to set aside every encumbrance, every sin, are you willing to suffer, please the one who enlisted you, are you wholehearted and single minded

VISUAL AID - THE GOOD SOLDIER OF JESUS CHRIST

MUST SUFFER HARDSHIP MUST ENDURE SUFFERING MUST FIGHT THE GOOD FIGHT

This week we spent the whole week meditating on the good soldier of Jesus Christ, and we learned some things about the Roman soldier that has helped us understand how we can become good soldiers of Jesus Christ.

How much time did Paul spend with Roman soldiers?

- he lived with them, 24/7, chained to a Roman soldier for about 2 years

- he had traveled with them so he understood their life on the road

So we could say that he was more than a casual observer of the Roman soldier, he knew everything about their life, their psychological makeup, their goals -- everything that made them tick. He also knew the level of commitment it took to be a Roman soldier, and he boldly declared that Timothy should follow their example as a good soldier of Jesus Christ.

The Roman soldier

What was the requirement to be a Roman soldier? Be a citizen, have a country to love, have property to defend

How does this compare to a Christian? How does this requirement fit into a comparison with the Christian soldier?

- must be a citizen of heaven, must be born again, must be a member of the Kingdom of God

- must love God's kingdom, must love other believers, must love the church of Jesus Christ

- must be committed to defending the Kingdom of God no matter what

What made the Roman soldier almost undefeatable according to #3 on the list on p. 53?

- the patriotism

What is patriotism?

- someone who shows love and loyal support for one's country
- someone who zealously supports his country

So if patriotism made the Roman soldier undefeatable, how does this transfer to the Christian soldier? What must the Christian soldier have in order to be a victorious Christian?

- love the Lord our God with all our heart and soul and mind
- zealously supports the authority and interest of God's kingdom

What is a good soldier to do 2:3? suffer hardship

In our lesson we looked at some definitions on p. 47. What did we learn about this phrase - suffer hardship?

- it means 'suffer evil' or 'suffer trouble' or suffer trouble with another

Who and what are the enemy?

- battle the world, our flesh, and the devil

Where is our allegiance? If our allegiance is truly to the kingdom of God, then what will we do? suffer hardship

How can we apply suffering hardship with the Christian life? As a soldier in active service for Christ, what does it mean to suffer hardship? What are some ways you suffer for the gospel?

In our American culture, how do we view suffering? something to be avoided

Are we ashamed of the suffering aspect of Christianity? Are we ashamed to tell people that if they accept Christ they also accept suffering, or do we just sell them a ticket to heaven?

Did the Roman soldier understand what would be expected of him when he enlisted as a Roman soldier?

How did Paul describe the extent of the hardship to expect?

- 2:9 - even to imprisonment as a criminal
- 2:10 - endures all things

We looked at the meaning of the word endure = remain under or abide under or live under

What does Paul say he is remaining under?

- v. 10 responsibility to give the gospel to the chosen, for the many who are searching for God, who are burdened under the weight of sin and despair

Why is Paul willing to stay under the load, to stay in the battle, to endure all things? Look at v. 4

- his first priority is to please the one who enlisted him as a soldier

If we look at the example of the Roman soldier, did he dare go against his commander? p. 54 - #7

- he feared his commander more than he feared the enemy

Timothy clearly understood the principle Paul was giving him because he knew the life of the Roman soldier

Paul feared God more than he feared the cruelty of men, Paul understood the sovereignty of God over all of his life.

What kept the Roman soldier strong and ready for battle? #8

- military exercises

Was there ever an excuse for not participating in the vigorous training?

- not age, not weather, nothing stopped the training

How do we as Christians keep strong and ready for battle?

- daily study of God's Word and prayer

- putting on the whole armor of God - Eph. 6

- Christian fellowship, worship, using our spiritual gifts

So coming back to Paul's statement in 2:3 . . . suffer hardship with me . . . this is a tough call, it is a high calling, it is an impossible task, and Paul knows that, so what has he said just before he tells Timothy to suffer hardship? What does he say in 2:1?

- be strong in the grace that is in Christ Jesus

This is sooooo important. We must daily come before God and declare our total dependence on Him, asking Him to live in and through us so that we can be a good soldier . . . so that we can stand against the evil forces, and the powerful influences of the world and against the desires of our own humanness.

This phrase 'be strong' is in the present tense meaning keep on being strong, keep on being empowered, otherwise you will not be able to suffer hardship.

Another verse that we have studied in ch. 1 also says the same thing. . . . join with me in suffering for the gospel according to the power of God --- based on the power of God that is available to us -- we cannot suffer for the gospel without the power of God, we cannot and will not be able to suffer for the gospel in our own limited strength.

In our lesson we were asked to look at another verse in 2 Timothy that had to do with the theme of enduring hardship and that is in 4:5 where Paul tells Timothy again to endure hardship and then in 4:7 he tells Timothy that he - Paul, has fought the good fight. This ties in the 1 Timothy 1: 18 and 6:12 where Timothy is told to fight the good fight.

Paul gives Timothy a tip in 2 Tim. 2:4 and he also gives the same tip in Hebrews 12:1. How is it possible to fight the good fight?

- don't be entangled = involved in, enweaved with

In Hebrews 12:4, what entangles a Christian and keeps him out of the battle or out of the race, as the illustration in Hebrews says? What are we to lay aside that will keep entangle us?

- every encumbrance

- sin

Read Heb. 12:4 what should we be striving against?

- we should be striving against sin, resisting sin

Are there other things besides sin that entangle a Christian? Can a Christian be entangled in good things that keep him from fighting the good fight?

- even church activities can entangle us and keep us weak and defeated

What keeps us strong?

- Bible study and prayer

Should we put a prerequisite on those who serve in the church, that they should not serve if it takes them away from their daily exercises of preparedness for the battle?

- Sue's leaders in Healing Hearts

When we look at the armor that is described in Eph. 6, it is the word of God and prayer that are the armor that is necessary to battle the spiritual forces we face daily.

The importance of supply lines in a battle - if the enemy can cut off the supply lines, what happens?

Can you see that the devil has us right where he wants us when we don't take time to read God's word and pray. If we wonder why the church in America is so weak, it is because our supply lines have been cut off by business, even good business.

Another tip that Paul gives us in 2 Tim. 2:3 -- what does Paul do for Timothy that we also need to do as we consider that we are in a battle?

- pray for each other, intercessory prayer is essential

We also had some information in our lesson on page 55 that gives us principles of warfare. What can we learn from these principles?

- objective

- offensive

- concentration

Any of these things have special meaning for you?

How are we doing? Are we in the battle? What has God spoken to you about this week?
